Challenges that generally run the full length of each lake. Every odd year, Lake Superior hosts a similar Challenge. In 2022, several SSC members successfully participated in singlehanded events, including the Challenges on Lakes Huron and Erie.

100-Mile Solo Shakedown

To kick off the singlehanded season, Russ Krock organized a 100-mile shakedown sail out of SSC. The overnight excursion started off the Sandusky Pierhead Light at noon on Saturday, June 4, heading NE for about 18NM to NOAA 45005, then turning East for another 36NM to the GLERL buoy due north of Cleveland before turning to head 53NM back to Sandusky. This was not an official event, but a casual primer for singlehanders to test gear, watch routines, rest practices and meal preparation. Commodore Wes Blazer, Rear Commodore Jason Huffman, and other SSC members Russ Krock, Rob Burger, Todd Mestrez and Jim Otton all enjoyed a nice night on Lake Erie. Several other sailors from neighboring clubs also joined in.

This was the first time such an event was put together to get ready for the singlehanded season, and nine sailors took advantage of the offering. We owe a big Thanks! to Russ Krock for coming up with the idea and then executing it.

Mackinac Island Solo Challenge

The first official singlehanded event of the year was the 2022 Mackinac Island Solo Challenge, which was scheduled to start at 1000 on Saturday, June 18, with fleets starting in both Chicago and Port Huron and meeting at Mackinac Island. The Chicago start went as planned, but the Port Huron start had to be delayed because strong north winds plus a 4-5 kt current under the Blue Water Bridge prevented some of the smaller boats from being able to get to the start line off Sarnia. Eventually, the wind and current subsided enough for the Port Huron fleet to get out of the St. Clair River and start at 2000; however, the wind was still blowing out of the north in excess of 15 kts and the sea was still running with 3-6 ft waves.

SSC was represented by Russ Krock (*Schock & All*), Rob Burger (*Storm's Harbor*) and Jim Otton (*WAFI*), all of whom finished the Challenge well-placed. Russ brought home 2nd place in the Superior class, while Jim and Rob finished 2nd and 3rd in the Michigan class, respectively. Following the delayed and lumpy start, Lake Huron was generally kind to the sailors except for a few hours of rain and a final day of heavy fog. Russ completed the 230NM course in 2 days 5 hours, while Jim and Rob finished 5 hours later.

Bayweek

For the first time in its 129-year history, the I-LYA included a singlehanded PHRF class in this year's edition of its annual Bayweek Sail Regatta. Fourteen boats participated and were broken down into two divisions, PHRF-A and PHRF-B. Of those 14 entries, five were skippered by SSC members.

There was no racing on Friday due to a lack of wind, but racing commenced in earnest on Saturday and Sunday, which gave the singlehanded fleet one start each day. The Saturday course took the fleet out to West Sister Island and back around Green Island for a course length of about 27NM. The Sunday course took the fleet south around Green Island to the green buoy off of CIC, then NW out around the yellow D buoy marking the Camp Perry firing range, then back around Green Island to the finish for a total of about 17NM. The biggest challenge on Saturday was light winds on the western half of the race course, while the biggest challenge on Sunday was the hundreds of fishing boats between Green Island and Catawba Island, and then another group near the D buoy. Thankfully, nearly all of the fishing boats were anchored, which made it easier to avoid them.

The SSC boats enjoyed a lot of success. Russ Krock and Lease Schock took 2nd and 3rd, respectively, both Saturday and Sunday in the PHRF-A division, which gave them the same overall results. In the PHRF-B division, Jim Otton finished 1st on Saturday and Rob Burger finished 1st on Sunday, giving Jim 1st overall and Rob 3rd overall. Jason Huffman also participated, but was able to sail on Saturday only.

Lake Erie Solo Challenge

The other official GLSS event in which SSC members participated this year was the Lake Erie Solo Challenge. It started at 1000 off North Cape Yacht Club on Saturday, Aug. 13, with the race course proceeding through Pelee Passage, over to Seneca Shoal (near Buffalo) and then back to Erie, PA for the finish and a total course length of 271NM. There were 24 boats on the start line, of which four were skippered by SSC members: Russ Krock, Lease Schock, RC Jason Huffman and Rob Burger.

The fleet started on a beautiful spinnaker reach through Pelee Passage until the wind shut off mid-afternoon. The fleet struggled to keep the boats moving for a few hours, until light pressure started filling in from the SE and generally held until it eased again mid-afternoon on Sunday. Into Sunday evening, the wind backed and built, forcing the fleet into a 60NM beat toward Buffalo in seas that reached a constant 4-6 ft, with a few 8-footers thrown in for good measure. The leg from Seneca Shoal to the finish at Erie was complicated by diminishing winds, shifty conditions, occasional rain and a few squalls along the American shoreline. The squalls caused a couple of boats to sustain knock-downs and their skippers to endure bruised egos as they fished their spinnakers out of Lake Erie.

Russ Krock sailed *Schock & All* to a 2nd place finish in the Superior class, while Rob Burger cruised *Storm's Harbor* into 1st place in the Michigan class. RC Jason Huffman brought *Glass Pony* into Erie in 4th place in the Superior class. Unfortunately, Lease Schock was unable to finish the race in *Avatar 2* because of battery charging issues in his newly fitted-out J105, but he'll be back with a vengeance next year.

It is worth noting that, despite the volatile weather typically encountered on Lake Erie in August, the SSC singlehanded sailors mostly prefer the Lake Erie Solo Challenge over the companion races on the other lakes. The host clubs, North Cape Yacht Club at the start and Erie Yacht Club at the finish, couldn't be more accommodating, helpful and friendly. Much like at SSC, the volunteers who work on the start boat and with the race committee at the finish make all the difference. The Lake Erie Solo Challenge is also unique in that the fleet must pass the finish in Erie, mid-race, and sail another 120NM to Seneca Shoal and back. In adverse conditions (like the long beat in heavy weather that we had this year), it's tempting to just pull into Erie and start the party early without finishing; so Lake Erie tests the skippers' mental toughness more than any of the other four lakes. Finally, a big shout-out to Lease Schock for all his hard work organizing the event as its Race Chair, which he has now done several years running.

The Rest of the Story

It's one thing to get your boat to the start line of a GLSS challenge, and then another thing to actually complete one. It is yet another thing altogether to get your boat back from the finish, whether it's Mackinac Island or Erie Yacht Club. Sometimes, getting back is half the fun. It's also when most of the really good sea stories take shape.
